

PASTOR'S COLUMN

The theme of holiness can be traced throughout today's passages. Gail Godwin, in a fascinating book of essays called *Heart: A Natural History of the Heart-Filled Life*, describes the Hebrew concept of holiness as "whole-heartedness." This is an excellent definition of the justice God desires and will one day bring about, when people will be whole-hearted in their love for God, others, themselves, and the world.

Amos's prophetic words, calling the people to account for their mistreatment of poor people, do not fall on open ears, and the priests try to get rid of him, suggesting he eat his bread elsewhere. Yet Amos remains faithful to the task God gives him, speaking truth to government, religious, and social leaders, reminding them that God demands justice of individuals and nations. This passage also reminds us that God calls people from all walks of life (including dressers of sycamore trees) to be spokespersons for justice on behalf of those who are hungry.

Psalm 85 poetically expresses the eschatological vision of the kingdom of God -- justice, peace, and wholeness in the world. These promises, which include

abundance from the fields and plenty to eat, provide hope in the struggle to end hunger and injustice.

Today's reading from Mark stresses that the call to discipleship sometimes means radical simplicity. Here the twelve disciples are sent on their journey without extra food or clothes. Sometimes following Jesus requires a different, simpler lifestyle, which is particularly difficult to do while living in North America. It is interesting that Jesus clearly communicates to the disciples that they are not responsible for how people respond to them. If they are not received, those who are inhospitable will have to answer for it someday. We may find this comforting when our pleas for justice seem to fall on deaf ears.

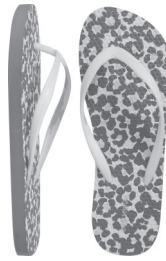

During our Vacation Bible School week, the children met with their tribe, made new friends, played games, created projects, learned new songs, and experienced a little bit what life was like in Nazareth during Jesus' time. We are so glad you all chose to spend the time experiencing this life-changing love, and to share that love with our children participants.

Amid palm trees, sheep pastures, tents, and shekels, the children, teens, and adults all made -- or renewed, and strengthened -- friendships in Hometown Nazareth. We saw God at work in the life of Jesus, who truly was one of us! Mary was the storyteller who shared stories about Jesus, helping us all understand that Jesus had a family, a home, that He served others and worshipped, just like us! (and most importantly, that He wants us to be like Him!). We also looked for and found many examples of God's love and presence in our families and world today! We learned how our Jewish ancestors used Tzedakah boxes to collect change, helping support those in need, especially when problems were connected to righteousness and justice. This year our children and families were able to support one of our Blessed Sacrament children, Ethan Hoffman, who has a genetic disease which affects his kidney function. We spent the week collecting change and were able to donate over \$200 to Ethan's family to help cover costs for ongoing medical expenses. The goal of our Warren Catholic Parishes has been to make VBS into a collaborative effort, with adults, teens, and children participating from our Warren area. LITURGY CORNER

Our “Liturgy Corner” takes a break from the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* as we take a closer look at the **Communion Rite during Mass**

For our last two columns we have looked to the fifth edition of Lawrence J. Johnson’s *The Mystery of Faith: A Study of the Structural Elements of the Order of the Mass*. We have taken a walk through the “historical survey” that he provides concerning the “Distribution of the Eucharist.”

Today’s column looks at how we receive communion today. We have quoted a column provided by our diocesan Office of Worship both in this column (in parts) and in the most recent parish newsletter. To offer this information in another form, we turn to a fairly recent document to come from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB): *Norms for the Distribution and Reception of Holy Communion Under Both Kinds in the Dioceses of the United States of America*. This was approved by the USCCB June 14, 2001. It then went to Rome and was approved by the Congregation for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacrament on March 22, 2002. Finally, it was made available here in the United States on April 7, 2002.

The title makes it sound like a laundry list of what to do and what not to do. That really isn’t it at all. This document is to always be published in any *Roman Missal*, so is included in *The Roman Missal, Third Edition*, that we now use at all Masses (as of Advent, 2011). Monsignor Joseph DeGrocco, a friend of this column since its inception, is the author of the overview of this document that is included in *The Liturgy Documents, Volume One (Fifth Edition)*. He describes this “Norms” document in this way:

As with the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM)*, this document contains a wealth of theological insight beyond just norms and instruction. The text is divided into two main parts: Part I, “Holy Communion: The Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus,” gives broad theological foundations for the celebration of the eucharist and reception of Holy Communion; Part II, “Norms for the Distribution of Holy Communion Under Both Kinds,” gives more specific and detailed norms for how Holy Communion under both kinds is to be carried out.

Before we look at this document, we will use Monsignor DeGrocco’s interpretation of the reception of Holy Communion under both forms. This is what we do here at Blessed Sacrament – at Sunday Mass, at daily Mass and at funeral Masses. It is not what is done everywhere throughout our country or even throughout our diocese. DeGrocco gives us some food for this week’s reflection:

It is unfortunate that there is a tendency in certain circles today to down play the importance of distributing Holy Communion under both kinds. This document clearly endorses the practice, and one might argue that the document supports a certain preference for its practice based on a full understanding of liturgical theology

rooted in the importance of the use of perceptible signs in the liturgy. Sacred realities are conveyed through the use of perceptible signs; signs perceptible to the senses. The Real Presence of the Lord is conveyed through the signs of bread and wine which have been transformed into his Body and Blood. It is by participation in those signs as we take and share in the Eucharistic bread and chalice, “that we obey the Lord’s command and grow in the likeness of the Lord whose Body and Blood they both signify and contain.” Therefore, as the document notes, the Church, in her wisdom, makes provision for receiving Holy Communion under both forms precisely because “sharing in both eucharistic species reflects more fully the sacred realities that the Liturgy signifies.”

Do you receive both the Body and Blood of the Lord? Yes or no, the above offers some ideas for reflection – “sacred realities,” “grow in the likeness of the Lord.” May your week include some prayer time and may next Sunday’s liturgy (where we all join together on Sunday at one Mass – 10:00 a.m.) offer an opportunity to receive Christ’s Body and Blood.
